


PLANNING OBJECTIVES & CONSIDERATIONS

- Large-scale improvements will need significant future discussion

Provide clear direction for what SROA will achieve.

Objectives


Results that require time and planning.

Recommendations

Actions taken to accomplish the goals and objectives.

PLAN GOALS

- Provide diverse, high quality recreation experiences that address all ages, abilities, and seasons
- Connect people to nature
- Maintain the quality and functionality of existing assets
- Strive to protect and enhance the natural environment
- Ensure financial sustainability



PRIORITIZATION CRITERIA

- Guides project phasing
- Collaborative process for annual budgeting
- Two steps:
 - How well does a proposed project address Plan goals?
 - How well does a proposed project achieve wide-ranging objectives?

CAPITAL PROJECTS LIST

- Can be updated and revised
- Planning level costs estimates, do not account for inflation
- Numbers can be used for budgeting and updating work plans
- Actual costs may vary substantially with permitting, sensitive natural areas, or facility customization

PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION

Consider...

- Capital project list and short-term action plan
- Prioritization criteria
- Funding sources and budget
- Master planning sites versus project-by-project implementation
- Appropriate level of community outreach and input
